COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course offers information on classroom applications of recent theory, research, and practice in the teaching of writing for elementary pre-service teachers. It involves the study of writers' processes and strategies through participation in a writing workshop.

- Explore issues in the teaching and learning of writing.
- Gain an understanding of how teacher language affects children's learning.
- Understand the importance of explicitly teaching writing skills to children.
- Understand the developmental stages of writing.
- Connect effective assessment strategies to instruction to improve student writing.

COURSE FORMAT

This course will be done independently online. Each week will be comprised of content lectures, discussion board posts and responses to address issues pertinent to the teaching of writing. Assignments will be completed to demonstrate an understanding of course content. A summative in-class final exam will conclude.
