COURSE DESCRIPTION

The Heritage and Culture field school is a six-credit, four-week experiential field school designed to introduce students to practical heritage and culture management skills. Fieldwork will focus on Yukon heritage and cultural resource management including issues relating to archaeology, conservation, archives, oral history, collections, and historic sites.

- Determine the logistics and cost of organizing community projects such as field camps and activities such as archaeology excavations and culture camps
- Write basic technical reports on various cultural resource management topics

DELIVERY METHODS/FORMAT

This course will be delivered through direct classroom contact and fieldwork.

Students will work on various projects in a collaborative environment. Students will be required to complete four assignments, including a process paper focusing on a heritage and culture project related to their community and/or employment area.
